Travel & Accommodation Grants for IJP Alumni

In collaboration with the International Journalists' Programmes (IJP), the Council for the Lindau Nobel Laureate Meetings is once again awarding travel and accommodation grants – this time for media representatives who would like to cover the Anniversary Meeting, the 75th Lindau Nobel Laureate Meeting.

International Journalists are invited **to apply until 8 March**.

The Council for the Lindau Laureate Meetings will cover accommodation costs for up to five nights and reimburse the travel costs (up to a certain pre-defined amount).

Lindau Meeting 2026

This year, more than 600 Young Scientists from around 100 countries conducting research in the fields of Physiology/Medicine, Physics, and Chemistry will engage with some **75 Nobel Laureates** from the natural sciences.

The programme includes numerous Lectures, Panel Discussions, Talks, and formats that emphasize the interdisciplinary character of the Anniversary Meeting. In addition, there are plenty of opportunities for informal exchange with the Meeting participants on the fringes of the sessions as well as during the Social Events. The communications team will try to arrange for interview appointments with Nobel Laureates and Young Scientists.

75th Lindau Nobel Laureate Meeting

Key themes of the 2026 Meeting, besides general current research in Physiology/Medicine, Physics, and Chemistry will revolve around:

- Is There a Global Health?
- What Could a Quantum Computer Be Used For?
- How Can Education Build Trust in Science?
- What Does it Mean to Understand?
- Where Does Life Come From?
- Is Commercialization Good for Science?

A preliminary programme will be available online in March.

Application for the Travel Grant

Journalists of the global **IJP alumni network** may apply referring to these **requirements**:

- Statement of your specific interest in the respective meeting and its participants
- Your plans for coverage (type and scope of work produced)
- The media outlet where you aim to publish your articles / pieces
- Your social media handles by which you promote the coverage
- CV summary outlining your professional experience and current position
- Links to 2-3 samples of your work

Restrictions

The Council for the Lindau Nobel Laureate Meetings intends to offer participation in the grant programme to as many different media representatives as possible. Therefore, journalists who have previously received a travel grant from the Lindau Meetings can unfortunately not be considered again.

Timeline

The application deadline is **8 March 2026**. Applicants will be notified of the results by the end of March

Accommodation and Travel Reimbursement Process

Upon acceptance for a 2026 media grant, participants will be **offered an amount to cover the travel costs**. The awardees will receive a link for self-registration. Once registered, the communications team will book a hotel room in Lindau for the confirmed dates.

Travel costs will be reimbursed after the Meeting, based on the submitted travel expense report, including the tickets.

As part of the application process, it is recommended that participants review their travel route to Lindau in advance to determine suitable travel dates.

The Lindau Nobel Laureate Meetings: Ambition and History

For seventy-five years, the Lindau Nobel Laureate Meetings have served as a unique forum for exchange between Nobel Laureates and Young Scientists. Every summer, more than 600 of the world's most talented Young Scientists and over 30 Nobel Laureates are invited to spend a week in Lindau, on the German side of Lake Constance, a week full of mutual inspiration and scientific encounters.

Since the first Meeting in 1951, more than 36,000 Young Scientists have participated in the Lindau Meetings – for many of them, it has been an experience that has shaped their careers and lives, making them part of a unique international network of scientific excellence. Through the Lindau Alumni Network, they remain connected with each other and with the Lindau Meetings, even years and decades later.

The original idea of the Meetings goes back to two physicians based in Lindau, Franz Karl Hein and Gustav Wilhelm Parade, as well as to Count Lennart Bernadotte af Wisborg, a member of the Swedish royal family who quickly became the spiritus rector of the Lindau Meetings. From the start, they saw the Meetings as a means to reconcile the peoples of post-war Europe, in particular, the younger generation. Lindau quickly developed into an international forum for the exchange of knowledge between nations, cultures, traditions, and disciplines.
